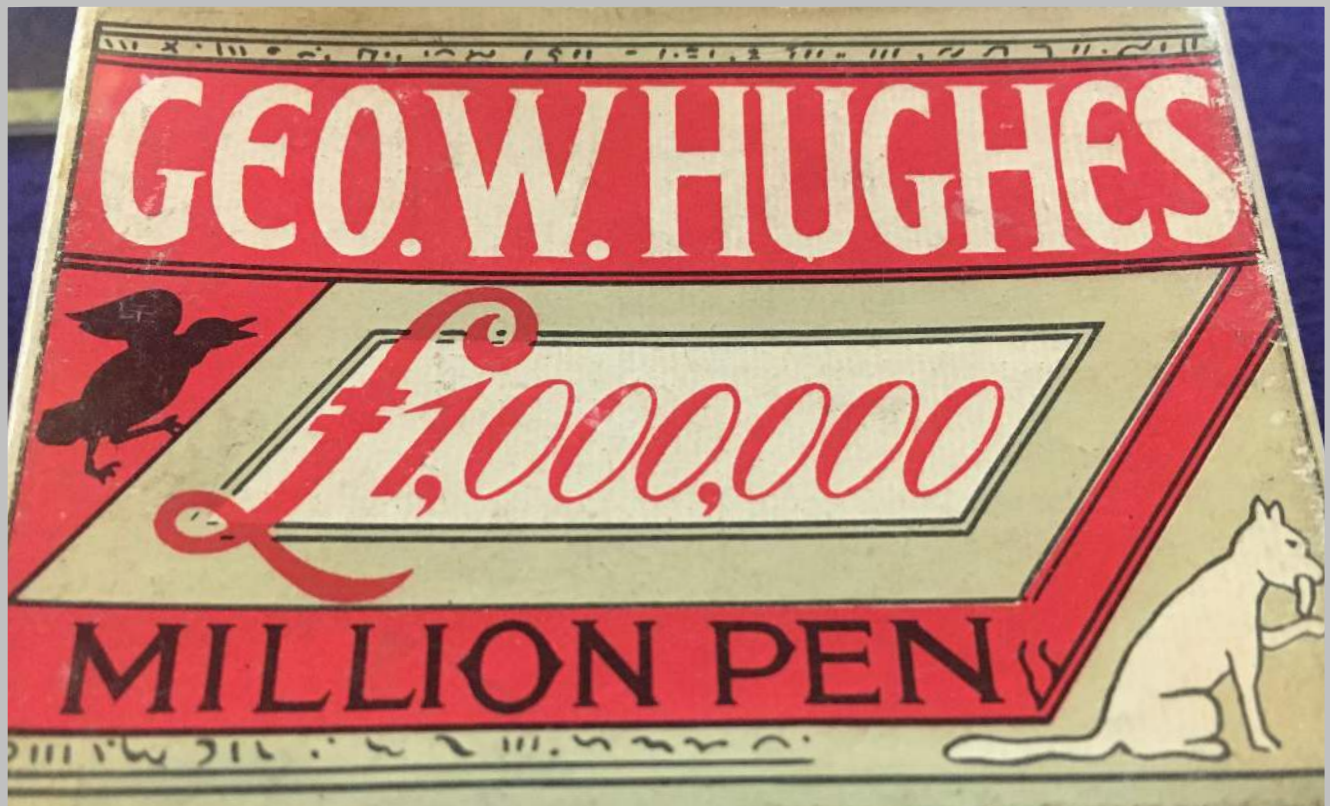


# PEN NAME



Pen manufacturers gave their pens bold, impressive names, which would reassure customers they were buying a reliable product. Some pens captured the excitement of important events in the hope of attracting more customers. Others were named after respectable organisations and British places.
